I continued to sew through my married life. When my two girls came along I made clothes for them. I went through a time when I didn't sew at all. Working and not making time to sew, my sewing machine collected a little dust.

When the kids were gone, living their own lives and I wasn't working anymore, I found myself looking for something to fill my time. While walking through a fabric store there it was, a flyer advertising a quilting class. I signed up and I was hooked.

The quilting journey I've been on since 1991 has been very rewarding. I can still remember the feeling I got finishing my first quilt that I did on my own. From choosing the pattern to hand quilting it and putting the final stitch in the binding. That warm fuzzy feeling is still with me today when I finish a quilt.

I joined the Cheyenne Heritage Quilters guild and began lasting friendships that helped me through fun times and some that were too challenging to go it alone. I was elected President in 1997 and all the members made my year a fun and memorable one. Everyone worked together, because that's what quilters do, and made it a great year.

When talk began about starting a state quilt guild I wanted to get involved. The goal was to gather quilters from around the state once a year at a convention and share all we knew about quilting. Wow, it worked, which wasn't a surprise because of all the talent here in Wyoming. The first year the convention was held in Cheyenne, I remember all the meetings, all the ideas going

through our heads, the beautiful quilt we all worked on and we worked very hard to make it the best it could be. We had a great time!

My quilting has slowed and I don't get to guild meetings now days. A terrible car accident in 2007 has left my husband unable to do much. My job now as caregiver takes up most of my time. I still meet with Florence Brown, Jeannie Wilson, Barbara Williams, Jane Kiddie, Margo Coughlin, and Pat Collins once a month. This applique group started soon after joining the club and is going strong today. We keep each other motivated and support each other in our everyday lives.

I'm so glad I took that quilting class. The people I've met, the knowledge I've gained from them and the everlasting friendships will be with me always. Quilters are the best. *Marianna*
