Jeanne's Cousin, Jeanne Allen, Jeanne's Mother Mariner's Compass Retreat

Jeanne, you are a founding member of the Wyoming State Quilt Guild. Please share your memories about how the Wyoming State Quilt Guild was created.

When my good friend Nancy (Vase) said, "We should have a state quilt guild like Nebraska." I thought "Well, that will never work because we live too far apart in Wyoming." When my friends Bonny, Twila, and Nancy said, "Let's go to a meeting to get this new venture organized !" I thought "Well at least I will get a good lunch and a day spent with friends". What a doubting Thomas I was! I am so happy to see what we have become and I treasure the memories, new friends and quilting experiences that WSQG has provided to me.

#### How did you get started on your quilt journey?

Both of my grandmothers, several aunties and cousins, and my mother are quilters. One of my most treasured possessions are the quilt frames that my great-grandfather sewing room is the secret to success. made out of rough wood, for my great-grandmother, from Polecat Hollow, West Virginia. Yes, that's a real place! As a young mother, I sewed clothes for the family and cross-stitched. When we moved to Wyoming in October of 1985, I received a care package from my mother containing hats, gloves, coats and quilt pieces. She said she heard that winter in Wyoming is long and cold and I would need something to keep me busy. Thus, the quilting journey started.



My first quilts the Eleanor Burns, Quilt in a Day books. I tore the strips, marked tied the quilts. Those first quilts have been loved

to death. The one lone survivor, a gray and black trip around the world quilt that my son still has. It is very fragile.

What do you like most about quilting? What are your favorite quilt styles and techniques?

My favorite quilt designs are those that incorporate both piecing and applique. I am drawn to civil war reproduction fabrics and my favorite color is BROWN. I have hand-dyed fabric using black walnut shells from the trees on the family farm in Ohio. I think that being from the Appalachian region has influenced my quilting choices. I believe that every quilt should have a label that tells it's story. I am very good at the prep work, sewing the quilt top and not so good at finishing the quilt. I am trying to get better. I firmly believe that an organized

#### What is your most memorable quilting experience?

My favorite quilting experiences are the many quilt retreats that Nancy and I (and many other friends) have attended together. Boy, did we have fun ! Another favorite was attending Quilt Festival in Houston. My alltime favorite was a Mariner's Compass retreat, held in my home town of Marietta, Ohio that my cousin Peggy, my mom Esther and I attended together. I still smile when I think of that time. Our quilts were so very different, and were made from of course my quilt has a story. As a teenager I dreamt that aliens had abducted me and my quilt tells that story.

What advice would you give beginning quilters?

I think that if I were to offer any advice to beginning quilters it would be to attend as many retreats, quilt everything with shows, and lectures that you can. You will learn many pencil and hand- things. You will make many new friends and have a wonderful time.

#### **SOUTHWEST** Nena James

Quilters in the Southwest Region are disappointed that classes and the trunk show for Quilting on the Green have again been cancelled due primarily to Covid restrictions. QOTG was originally scheduled for

late May and then rescheduled for late October. The QOTG Committee still plans to have a quilt show and vendor mall. The Hunters' Widow Retreat, tentatively scheduled for early November, has also been cancelled due to an inability to locate a suitable venue which could provide recommended social distancing. I think all of us have finally accepted the fact that quilt events in this region will not resume until 2021, at the earliest.

Earlier this year I shared some information and thoughts about the sad and untimely death of Nancy Vase, a WSQG founder who was the impetus behind the creation of the Wyoming State Quilt Guild. Nancy left behind a huge fabric stash and many quilts. All of which had to be dealt with by her two sisters, Peggy Peterson from Oregon and Jean Peterson from Nebraska. Peggy and Jean have spent about two weeks in Rock Springs this summer sorting through the fabric stash and quilts. They did this in consultation with Nancy's son, Miles, and various members of Sweetwater Piecemakers, Nancy's local quilt guild.

We all knew that Nancy made a lot of quilts but we had no idea what that actually meant. When all was said and done, there were over 30 storage boxes of fabric. Finished quilts were documented and photographed and the final tally was 213 quilts! Over fifty pieced but unquilted tops remain to be documented and photographed. All of this does not reflect the countless number of quilts made by Nancy during her lifetime that were given to family and friends or donated to various causes. It is a remarkable quilt legacy.

I spent some time at Nancy's house with Peggy and Jean during this process. It was both heartbreaking and amazing to see her quilts. They encompassed every style and quilt technique available. But it really got me thinking about my stash and stack of quilts, both finished and unfinished. I thought about what this would all mean to my family and friends if they were left to deal with it. While my stash and quilts would not even come close to what Nancy had, it could still be a real challenge to whoever has to deal with it when I am gone. I think it is something that we all need to think about and address during our respective lifetimes. I want my quilt legacy to be a gift rather than a burden to those I leave behind.

To that end, I have resolved to revisit my stash of fabric, quilt kits and finished and unfinished quilts to purge what I know I will never use and organize what is left. I know that fabric and kits which I will never use can be used by some other quilter and I will feel less guilty if it is given to them now. I will still have more projects than I can ever hope to complete in my lifetime but I intend that they will be organized and that quilt backs and bindings will be stored with unquilted tops and/or the appropriate kit. And I am resolved to complete more projects rather than leaving a lot of projects unfinished.

To help you understand the extent of Nancy's quilt and design skills I want to share with you two of her most special quilts.

The first quilt is titled Tuesday Evening 9-11. Nancy designed and completed it on the evening of September 11, 2001, as she watched the events of that day unfold. I think her design, fabric choices and quilt design really capture the mood of that day.



The second quilt is titled Desert Storm/Sea of Sand and "was designed and made in commemoration of and in tribute to those who served in Desert Storm". It was completed in April, 1992. Included in the quilt are pieces of fabric signed by prominent military, political and media leaders of that time. Nancy sent pieces of fabric to them, explained her project and asked that they sign and return them to her.

According to the quilt label, pieces of fabric were signed by Pete Williams, Asst. Secretary of Defense; General Tom Kelly; General Norman Schwarzkopf; Bernard Shaw, CNN; Dick Cheney, Secretary of Defense; General Colin Powell, Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff; Brigadier General R. J. Neal; and Peter Arnett, CNN.

One of the best things about Nancy's completed quilts is that they are labeled and that she included a lot of information on her labels. I tend to be very lax about labeling my quilts but I now understand the value of putting a meaningful label on every quilt I complete. Those labels were a tremendous help in fully understanding Nancy's quilt collection.

I contacted quilt stores throughout the Southwest Region and it appears that those stores are open and serving the needs of quilters although some stores have a few virus-related restrictions. Because of social distancing and mask requirements most stores have not yet resumed classes.

I hope everyone is staying safe and using this time to do a lot of sewing and quilting. We are so lucky to have a hobby that helps us cope with the isolation and restrictions related to the Covid virus.

#### Quilts of Valor Journey

My journey with the military began this year when my youngest son became a Marine. I am proud of him and his accomplishments. I'm even prouder that he has chosen to follow in the footsteps of his father, also a Marine, and many relatives that have served and are serving in the military today. As a family member of a serviceman or woman, our support is a vital piece to their success. Before my son enlisted, I always felt a calling to support our servicemen and women. They are called upon in times of conflict and have given up time with their families to serve this country in this important role.

I have been a quilter since 1997. My mother is a quilter and my grandmother was a seamstress by trade. I have always made quilts for friends and family. It was only natural that I use this area of interest to support our past and present military members, but how?

Our military veterans have served in many conflicts and I can continue to support them through the Quilts of Valor Organization. The National Quilts of Valor Foundation began in 2003 and the Laramie chapter began in 2017. Laramie QOV is a small group in its infancy. The **PHD Quilters** in Douglas Wyoming have been busy with projects over the summer. We presented a dozen pillow cases to DFS in Douglas to give to the kids in their care. They recently finished the Quilt of Valor for a Glenrock veteran to be presented in November. They are eagerly planning what they will be doing in the coming year.

Kalico Kat in Casper officially became an essential worker, Sandie responded to the call for masks and gowns. Her shop was even featured in the WMC newsletter. She has received donations for the making many masks to give to the community. Any person that comes in asking for a mask will receive two masks, one to wash and one to wear. Here is Sandie's message to anyone wanting to help with making and distributing masks in Casper."

Donation Masks are still needed. Community Health on Blackmore Road is in need of face masks. Also the assisted living places need masks. Please check with them before delivering masks there. We are also asking for masks for school teachers and children going back to school. If you can please whip a few up for Community Health, take them to the front desk as you enter. The people there know where they are to go. They want masks for the patients coming in. Also, some masks we are receiving are too big. Please cut down either the width of the mask, or make the ear loops smaller. I think we started making them for men, and now they are falling off the faces of women. Thank you to everyone who started cutting them down for the kids. And using kids' fabric. They have really enjoyed picking out their own.."

Please pass the word that if anyone is in need of masks, please call...Kalico Kat is handing out masks for those who are in need. These are donated fabrics and volunteer-made masks, so they are FREE. If you would like, you may make a donation to cover the cost of fabric and supplies for masks. Contact Sandie at Kalico Kat in Casper.

You too could "Be An Elf" stocking maker. Are you interested in making Christmas stockings to brighten the day for a resident in a nursing home? Pam B. will be supplying precut stockings for everyone to make. All you have to bring is your sewing supplies, (machine, thread, pins, etc.). If you have any embellishments you might want to use them. They are going to be doing one class for the next three months so everyone can plan to come at least one time and help. She doesn't know just yet how many they need, but the more the better... If you feel uncomfortable with sewing at the shop, you may be able to pick up some kits to take home and sew. They will be taking names and how many you want to take, for anyone who would like to do that.

The first date to come in and sew is Saturday August 29th. The second date is Saturday, September 26th. The third date is Saturday, October 24th.

Many in the nursing homes have been shut in due to Covid-19. Some are not even allowing patients to go outdoors to get some sunlight. If we can brighten their lives just a little, it would be worth a few hours of our time...

Thank you to Sandie and her crew and many many volunteers that have helped to make these masks and Christmas stockings possible.

It is a little less busy this time around for the region. County fair open classes were cancelled at many places, but we kept on quilting.


The Threaders Group of Sheridan met in the park on August 25<sup>th</sup>. Twelve ladies were busily knitting, hand sewing or


